Unless you have been hiding under a rock, you know that we are in an election season. And this election season is particularly messy and divisive. Our country seems to be divided and polarized far more than most election seasons. It is hard to have a conversation about politics without one or both people in the conversation getting mad at each other. And despite being so connected, we live in significant isolation from our neighbors, much preferring to surround ourselves with people and viewpoints we agree with than those that challenge us.

Jesus makes it clear in the parable of the Good Samaritan that our neighbor, the one we are called to love, is not the one who is similar to us, but the one who is different from us. Our neighbor in this election cycle is the one who votes differently from us. Sadly, not many Christians in the public eye are displaying this love of the other, as both liberal and conservative Christians take swipes at the other side and at each other.

In our church family, we have people who will vote for Donald Trump, and we have people who will vote for Kamala Harris. Given that reality, what does it look like for us as the body of Christ to love not only those who vote differently from us out in the world, but love those who vote differently from us in our own church family? Let me offer three principles that I believe will help us truly love one another. These are principles that I need to hear just as much as anyone else. They are not easy to implement given the divisive nature of our politics right now, but I do believe this is what we are called to as followers of Jesus.

1. Vote your conscience, not party. Christian author and blogger Trevin Wax recently wrote an article for the Gospel Coalition in which he notes how both Democrats and Republicans have shifted major policy positions in the last 30 years (https://www.thegospelcoalition.org/blogs/trevin-wax/borders-change-stay-settled/). Go back 70 years, and the two parties look drastically different from how they do today. This shouldn't surprise us, as the only one who does not change is God and his Word (Hebrews 13:8, James 1:17, Psalm 119:89). People, institutions, and parties on the other hand can and do change with regularity. What this means for us as followers of Jesus is that we should look to the Word of God and not to political parties for Christian values as we vote. Even if you feel one party represents more Christian values than the other (which I would imagine most of us do!), no political party has a complete monopoly on God's will.

I once heard that the best way to take in the news is to have a newspaper (or a news app!) in one hand and a bible in the other. Maybe then the best way to vote is to have a sample ballot in one hand and a bible in the other. Then pray, work through each ballot issue, and vote your conscience. The benefit of voting this way as opposed to a straight party line vote is twofold: One, we include the Lord in our voting in a more active way. And two, it moves us away from an "us vs. them" mentality. We understand that some brothers and sisters in Christ voting their conscience may lead to them voting differently from us as different biblical values are weighing on their hearts. And that's OK. But those brothers and sisters are not the opposition, they are family members who simply voted differently from us.

2. Remember that this is an election, not a war. Politicians and political pundits portray their opponents not as Americans who have strong policy disagreements, but as enemies who threaten the very fabric of our country, if not our entire world. They do this to increase fear and motivate people to vote. And this is nothing new. Every four years we hear how our country will cease to exist if a certain person is voted into office. I think you have to go back at least 10-15 years to find a politician who did not engage in this kind of rhetoric.

The problem is that if we adopt such a mentality as followers of Jesus, then it will lead us to seeing brothers and sisters who vote differently from us not as brothers and sisters, but as the enemy. Political disagreements between brothers and sisters are made much worse when you view the other's position (and maybe the person themselves) as a threat to you. But if we can remember that elections are elections and not a battlefield, then it will be much easier to love the one who disagrees with us.

It is helpful to remember that there was (and still is!) much about our character and heart that is offensive to God. But he loved us and sent his Son to die for us anyway (Romans 5:8). If that is the grace and mercy that God has lavished on us, then surely we can lavish a tiny fraction of that grace and mercy on one another. What might that look like in practice? A few thoughts...

- Don't repeat what you hear on the news in conversation with someone who disagrees with you.
 The news media (liberal and conservative) is not kind, and so when you repeat something from the news you will probably reflect the same lack of kindness.
- Ask someone who disagrees with you how they came to hold that position. And if they explain
 their view, don't have an argument ready to persuade them, but thank them for sharing.
- Find out what biblical values are shaping how a person votes. You'll be surprised that many Christians who vote differently from you are voting based on solid biblical principles. They are probably not the same principles that are shaping how you vote, but that doesn't mean that they aren't biblical. The more we see that we are trying to honor God with how we vote, the less likely we will be to condemn or attack each other. And while such conversation will probably not change the way that we vote, it may at least open our eyes to important biblical values that we might not be thinking about.

I'm sure you can add to this list of suggestions, and if you have ideas for how we can engage in more gracious, loving dialogue with one another during this election season, I would love to hear it. And no matter how you vote, know that you are deeply loved.
