"As iron sharpens iron, so one person sharpens another." -Proverbs 27:17

For the first few months of this year in my newsletter article I have suggested that the biblical pathway to change is not to try harder, but instead to put ourselves in the way of God's grace so that he can change us to make us more like Jesus. The steps we take to put ourselves in the way of God's grace are what theologians call "means of grace." And so I am using these first few months of 2025 to explore various means of grace, so that we can get in the way and stay in the way of God's transforming grace throughout 2025. So far we have looked at the Bible and prayer as key means of grace. This month, I want to explore another means of grace that is equally important yet often neglected in one's discipleship to Jesus: brothers and sisters in Christ. If we want to be closer to God so that we can be transformed by God, we need other Christ-followers in our lives to make that happen.

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Why is fellowship with brothers and sisters in Christ as a means of spiritual growth so often neglected? Well for one, we live in a highly individualistic society, where we are encouraged to dig down deep within ourselves to accomplish our goals; relying on others for help is often seen as a weakness in our culture. Sadly, the slogan "me, Jesus, and my bible," reflecting this individualism, is too commonly heard in many Christian circles. But two, many of us have had experiences where we have been hurt by a brother or sister in Christ, making it hard to trust others with the deep matters of our heart. So we may be happy to come to church and enjoy worshiping together and enjoy a meal together, but anything more vulnerable than that is hard for many of us. Thus we default to a highly individualistic, personal relationship with God, and only turn to others for help when we really find ourselves stuck in our walk with Jesus.

But the bible clearly calls us to experience deep, intimate, personal, and vulnerable relationships with fellow Christ-followers as a regular part of our discipleship to Jesus. Jesus clearly intended these kinds of relationships and modeled them in his relationships with his disciples. In the book of Acts we see the early church enjoying deep relationships with one another (Acts 2:42-47). Even the term "brothers and sisters in Christ" gives a key to the depth of relationships we can and should have with fellow believers. In the ancient Mediterranean world, the closest, most intimate relational bond was not between a husband and wife, but between siblings. It is that level of vulnerability and trust that we are called to with our fellow brothers and sisters in Christ.

Why are fellow believers so important as a means of grace for spiritual growth? Why do fellow believers sharpen one another like iron sharpens iron? Several reasons: first, a brother or a sister in Christ can see things in you that you might not be able to see in yourself. Just like when driving a car, we all have blind spots in our own lives, and others can help us see those blind spots so that we can let the Holy Spirit into those blind spots. Second, a brother or sister in Christ can check in with you, and hold you accountable in a loving and supportive way to continue staying close to the Lord. And finally, the more vulnerable and transparent we are with fellow believers about what is going on in our heart, the more transparent we will be with God about what is going on in our heart. Our ability to engage in deep, personal relationships with one another is directly related to how close we are to God.

What this means is that fellow believers are a critical means of grace for the Christian life. This will require a shift for many of us, because we are used to doing the Christian life on our own, seeking God's will on our own, and viewing fellow believers as the people we worship with and go to bible study with, but not those with whom we truly open up to and share our hearts. This will require a shift from seeing fellow believers as an occasional resource to draw from when we are stuck to a vital resource that we need every day. This will require a shift from being a "lone ranger" Christian to being a "I can't survive without my brothers and sisters in Christ" Christian.

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How can we begin to open our hearts more to our brothers and sisters in Christ? A few practical suggestions: First, don't feel like you have to share the depths of your heart with everyone, start with a few trusted people in your life who believe in Jesus. Second, if you are not part of a small group or mid-week bible study, talk to me about how you can get involved in one. Being part of a small group during the week can help you grow closer to fellow believers so you can open your heart to them. Third, be open to input and suggestions from fellow believers who know you and love you. And finally, when you are in a small group setting and discussing the Christian life, shift from "we" to "I," and from "us" to "me." It is easy when discussing a biblical truth to talk about how that applies to "us" generally. But be willing to share personally and share how that truth applies to "me" specifically.

I realize that I am challenging us as a church family to experience a level of vulnerability with fellow believers that may stretch many out of their comfort zones. But I promise you that the spiritual fruit that comes from such relationships is absolutely worth leaving that comfort zone for. These kinds of relationships push us to God's throne of grace and keep us at God's throne of grace. And that is the place where real spiritual growth happens:

"Then we will no longer be infants, tossed back and forth by the waves, and blown here and there by every wind of teaching and by the cunning and craftiness of people in their deceitful scheming. Instead, speaking the truth in love, we will grow to become in every respect the mature body of him who is the head, that is, Christ. From him the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament, grows and builds itself up in love, as each part does its work" (Ephesians 4:14-16).
